


too. It really can be anything, just let your imagination run wild! No logos though please.

Thank you for your support and we cannot wait to see what bewe-tiful designs you all come up with.
















The week in Year 3 and 4



We worked out we had 24/8ths or 3 whole cakes. Some of us knew this would be 48/16ths if we had a larger class. Well done everyone; some great maths!








In science this week we have asked ourselves 'Do heavier items have more water resistance?' We carried out some investigations and we realised that water resistance depends on how streamlined an object is. Objects of the same mass fell at different rates, depending on their shape. We also enjoyed getting our hands dirty with modelling clay, as well as proving our theory was correct.
