Headteacher Update

Every child has the right to a good education. We want our children to thrive, and to be healthy and happy. For this to happen the majority of young people need to be attending school, seeing their friends, and learning in the classroom. Most children in England agree with this assessment. The Children's Commissioner for England's 'Big Ask' survey from March 2022 gathered over 550 000 responses from children and demonstrated during the pandemic how much they had missed face-to-face teaching, spending time with their friends, and the extra-curricular activities that brought joy and excitement to their lives.



The benefits of school are many. It offers positive adult role models and gives children a strong foundation for their interactions in society. School helps young people build confidence, which is crucial to healthy self-esteem. It encourages independent critical thinking and self-expression. These skills translate to every area of life, whether it is in academia, the workplace, or relationships. School widens a child's horizons and influences their aspirations. Schools are more than just classrooms, they are communities.


Remember...








An amazing start to the year and I am excited to see the children continue to progress and thrive throughout the year. Well done Year 3 and 4!

The week in Year 5 and 6



English

We have launched our new English book this week, *Letters from the Lighthouse by Emma Carroll* and the children are so excited about it.

We weren't supposed to be going to the pictures that night...not when German bombs had been falling like pennies from a jar. February, 1941. A bomb blast... A chance encounter... Her mother's coat...

This is all Olive can remember of the night her sister Sukie went missing. With London unsafe, Olive and her brother are evacuated to the Devonshire coast to stay with a mysterious lighthouse keeper. There, Olive must solve a mystery of her own: a strange coded note which seems to link Sukie to Devon, and to something dark and impossibly dangerous.



Linked to our English book, we are studying the amazing work of two contemporary artists, Ayza Obra and Ida O'Keefe. Their lighthouse work is amazing and the children have been discussing the different styles of both artists and looking at the techniques that they use. Over the next few weeks, we will be adapting their styles and creating our own versions.



Computing

We started our computing lessons discussing e-safety and types of information that is out there on the internet. This week we have considered what information we should and shouldn't share with others online and that we need to keep lots of information private.
