Headteacher Update

As we come to the end of week 3 in school it seems like the summer holidays are a distant memory. The children have already covered so much in class and produced some unbelievably talented pieces of work.

The atmosphere of the school is fantastic with all the children and staff working hard which allows the children to have excellent experiences. The children are focused and determined to succeed which is a brilliant trait and will ensure they flourish as the year continues.

As I move around school it is great to see that Phonics is well underway in Reception and Key Stage 1 so for those children who are beginning to read, it is an exciting time. I always think there's something very special as you hear the children blend sounds together to read a word for the very first time. Of course, as vital as phonics is, it is not enough alone to create fully accomplished readers; hearing stories read aloud is an equally important aspect of our strategy around teaching children to read. All classes have the opportunities each day to listen to an adult read as we allowed for this to be timetabled. To further support this, please do ensure you find time to read at home with your children.

In addition to phonics our Reading Plus programme is in full flow and we have children from Year 2 to Year 6 now online. Our staff have worked very hard to get this up and running so please encourage your children to spend some time on this at home as it's a wonderful programme and needs very little parental input.

As a school we are proud to say that we are in the top 10 on the National Leaderboard for schools with the most active members so let's keep going!

Our value this month is 'Respect' and I am proud to say that as a school I think we show this in abundance. A perfect example of this is from our children in Year 6, who earlier this week went to Belsay Hall to complete a 'special job'. Their behaviour and attitudes were outstanding and the level of respect they showed to the staff at Belsay Hall and members of the public was exemplary - well done Year 6!

Finally, congratulations to all the children who have had the Hot Chocolate reward and to all those children nominated for the Outstanding Achievement Awards. Presenting these awards makes me proud of such awesome work, you superstars!

Every child has the right to a good education. We want our children to thrive, and to be healthy and happy. The Children's Commissioner for England's 'Big Ask' survey from March 2022 gathered over 550 000 responses from children and demonstrated during the pandemic how much they had missed face-to-face teaching, spending time with their friends, and the extra-curricular activities that brought joy and excitement to their lives.

The benefits of school are many. It offers positive adult role models and gives children a strong foundation for their interactions in society. School helps young people build confidence, which is crucial to healthy self-esteem. It encourages independent critical thinking and self-expression. These skills translate to every area of life, whether it is in academia, the workplace, or relationships. School widens a child's horizons and influences their aspirations. Schools are more than just classrooms, they are communities.

The week in Reception

The children have been amazing again this week, and it is hard to believe they have only been in school for two and a half weeks.

This week we have been focused on exploring. Some of us have explored what happens when we mix colours. We found out that if we add white to colours it makes them lighter, if we mix two colours together it makes a new colour and if we mix every colour together at the same time it makes a brown colour. The children have loved this and we are trying hard to remember how to make different colours, by telling a friend how we have made them.



Another way we have been exploring has been with magnets. The children have enjoyed making a prediction as to whether something is magnetic or not. We tested lots of things both inside and outside of the classroom. We quickly realised that plastic and wood were not magnetic. However the children were surprised by some things that they thought looked like they would be magnetic, but they weren't.


The week in Key Stage 1



In English, we have been learning about King Arthur and have slowly explored how he became King. It has been great for the children to act out the story, create storyboards in their own words before then retelling the story in their own words. Everyone worked super hard on this and produced some gorgeous work that they were all extremely proud of. It was great to see in a few days how every person in the class could confidently retell the story whilst also including similes, fronted adverbials and some amazing adjectives. They should all be very proud! We also started our new English text this week 'The Anglo-Saxon Boy' by Tony Bradman which the children are excited to continue.

English

Reading Comprehension

We are continuing to develop our reading comprehension skills through a variety of different ways, including our new Reading Plus programme online, small group reading with an adult in class and through answering questions using our VIPERS.
