### This week in Maple Class


To celebrate Made in the North East Week, Maple Class had a fabulous trip to the Quayside and Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art on Thursday. We began the day by learning about the venue and what contemporary art is. We looked at an open submission exhibition of art that showcased 100 pieces by North East hobbyists and self-taught creatives alongside works from several established artists. We were surprised to hear that one piece of art in the exhibition to create abstract art from different materials. Later, we went up to the Northumbria University Gallery; *Stepping Softly on the Earth.* We admired a peaceful sound sculpture in this exhibition and also sat around an indigenous inspired sculpture to listen to a story about a goddess and equality. We learnt that often artwork has a story behind it which gives it meaning. After, we went to the Baltic viewing platform to sketch the bridges over the River Tyne before walking across the millennium bridge. The views were fantastic!

## This week in Alder Class

To celebrate Made In The North East Week, Alder Class had an amazing day exploring the different modes of transport around the North East and were thinking about how they could navigate different stations, know they are definitely on the correct train/bus/metro/plane and also started to think about how to keep ourselves and others safe. We were so lucky to be able to experience all of these and start to think about the history behind each mode of transport and link it back to our learning from this week.

We started the day by getting a coach to Newcastle Quayside and exploring all the different ways we could travel around the North East from there. It was so interesting to see how the different bridges have different purposes and we were amazed to know people use electric scooters and sometimes jet skis as well as more traditional ways of travelling. We then walked to Newcastle Central Station where we were challenged to navigate our way around the station in small groups in order to get to the right destination. Everyone loved this part as we were able to ask staff for help, double check we were confident it was our train and know what time our train would arrive. We also loved seeing the security guards and understanding how they are there to keep us safe. We discussed a lot about safety when in the station and how it was important to keep ourselves and others safe as well as comparing the station now to its history. After that we were able to take the Metro to Newcastle Airport. I think the Metro was most peoples favourite as it was a new experience for them and they knew where it was going and how many stops they had until we arrived. We did so well at reading the Metro maps and gaining a stronger understanding of how they work as well as learning some new facts about the Metro and how it is special to the North East. We then explored Newcastle Airport and discussed the different steps you would take before getting on the plane and discussed why all these steps were important before walking down Ponteland Old Railway tracks into Ponteland for lunch. We enjoyed seeing how the path had been transformed into a walking path now and this was also a great time to let loose and enjoy walking without the busy roads near us. After lunch we then walked to the bus stop in Ponteland and took the x74 bus back to Belsav.

We were all interested in knowing which mode of transport was our favourite of the day and understanding why it may be different for everyone. We have also been looking at the advantages and disadvantages this week of different modes of transport and exploring whether this would impact our decision to use them or not. Everyone was so well behaved the entire day and were also able to apply all their road safety knowledge and this showed just how mature and respectful Alder Class are.
