



E-Safety

Intention- What do we want the children to know?

We want every child to know how to stay safe online. We will provide them with the skills to ensure they know how to ask for help and support online and the signs to look for to realise they need to tell a trusted adult. We will ensure children have access to the internet and are aware of child friendly websites they can access to gather information. Our children will follow our school charter and rules: 'we take care of ourselves, we take care of others and we take care of our world' to ensure they are safe online.

Implementation- What will this look like in school?

We will take part in E-safety week in school to provide children with the chance to engage in the subject and become aware of how to keep themselves safe online. Throughout the year children in Reception and KS1 will use the story of 'Chicken Clicking' to highlight how to stay safe online at an age appropriate level. Children in KS2 and UKS2 will engage in activities such as making posters, looking at age limits of websites they can access online and making links to different websites, apps and games that they can access. This allows for discussions to take place between the staff and children and children can ask questions and find out the answer to them.

E-safety is also an area that will be addressed in PSHE lessons across the school particularly in the Summer term when each class will spend time covering the topic of 'Staying safe' all children will engage with these lessons.

Impact- How will we know we have made a difference?

Children will be able to access the wider world using the internet on a range of different devices and know how to keep themselves safe online. Children will ask questions and become inquisitive learners who understand the reason they need to stay safe online. Children will be aware of what to do in a situation should it arise using the method of 'tell or show a trusted adult' if they don't understand or recognise something online. All children will have had access to a range of lessons on E-safety and children should be able to articulate how they can stay safe online.
